Three-Point Lighting

1. Key Light
2. Fill Light
3. Back Light

Lighting Tips

- Avoid harsh shadows.
- Use soft lighting for interviews.
- Maintain consistent light throughout the scene.
- Balance indoor and outdoor lighting.

Types of Microphones

Sound Recording Tips

- Reduce background noise.
- Monitor audio with headphones.
- Keep the microphone close to the speaker.
- Record room ambience when required.
- Check sound levels before recording.

Script Writing

A script is the written plan of a video or film.

Elements of a Script

- Title
- Scene Heading
- Character Names
- Dialogue

- Camera Notes
- Sound Effects

Tips for Script Writing

- Keep the story simple.
- Write clear dialogues.

- Maintain logical sequence.
- Focus on the target audience.
- End with a strong conclusion.

Storyboarding

A storyboard is a visual representation of each scene before filming.

Importance of Storyboarding

- Organizes ideas visually.
- Saves production time.
- Helps camera planning.
- Improves communication among team members.
- Reduces production errors.

Components of a Storyboard

- Scene Number
- Sketch/Image
- Camera Angle
- Shot Description
- Dialogue
- Duration

Direction & Video Editing

Direction

The director is responsible for transforming the script into a visual story.

Responsibilities of a Director

- Interpret the script.
- Guide actors and presenters.
- Coordinate with the production team.
- Plan camera angles and movements.
- Ensure continuity during filming.
